Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

July 5, 2009
Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Exodus 2:2-5
Psalm 123
2 Corinthians 12:7-10
Mark 6:1-6a

A reading from the Gospel according to **Mark**:

Jesus departed from there and came to his native place, accompanied by his disciples.

When the sabbath came he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astonished.

They said, "Where did this man get all this?

What kind of wisdom has been given him?

What mighty deeds are wrought by his hands!

Is he not the carpenter, the son of Mary,

and the brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon?

And are not his sisters here with us?"

And they took offense at him.

Jesus said to them,

"A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house."

So he was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them.

He was amazed at their lack of faith.

3. Reflect on a time when you took Jesus for granted. What led you to move from that position to one of deeper faith and commitment?

OUR LITURGY TODAY—Because of sin, sickness and death have entered the world, but are overcome through the resurrection of Jesus. He hears the cry of those in need, healing the sick and raising the dead to life. He made himself poor that we might become rich.

PETER’S PENCE COLLECTION—This annual collection helps fund the many charitable works of our Holy Father. We invite your generosity towards this support collection for our Holy Father.

INDEPENDENCE DAY—This Saturday is July 4, Independence Day. Let us say an extra prayer of thanks to our Lord for the freedom we have and also remember those who do not have freedom. Also, be safe!

GOLF OUTING — Our parish Golf Outing will be Monday, July 20, at the Smithtown Landing Golf Club. Tee time is 10:30am. Cost per golfer remains the same as in past years: \$150 per golfer. A buffet dinner, catered by the Irish Coffee Pub, will take place in our parish center after golf. To reserve your place, please return the cut-out in the bulletin. There will be raffles, prizes and fun for all! CATHOLIC MINISTRIES APPEAL—We invite every family to support this year’s Catholic Ministries Appeal. To date, we have received pledges in the amount of \$56,695 towards our goal of slightly over \$59,020. Please be as

WHAT’S HAPPENING IN OUR FACILITY—We have found it unnecessary to turn on our irrigation system, saving our valuable water resource. The ponding in the parking lot is caused in part from the underground river that goes under the clothing bin and through the parking lot. Speaking of water, we replaced another flush-o-meter in older restrooms with an automated one. If it does not operate automatically, simply push the black button. We will refinish the tile floor in the White Room in the next few weeks. *Progress!*

CENSUS—Over the course of the Summer, we will include an insert in the bulletin asking every household to complete the form which simply lists those who live in each household and to supply working phone numbers and e-mails. The process of updating our data base will take several months. We find that phone numbers have changed for many households. We also have people on our census data base who have moved from their families. With everyone’s help, we can update everything.

SUNDAY HELPING PRIEST—Over the Summer, Fr. Bob will enjoy the fact of not having to commute on the LI Expressway. In his place, Fr. Irinel Racos will assist with the celebration of Masses in our parish. He will become a Chaplain in St. Anthony’s High School in South Huntington, replacing Fr. Gerry Gordon.

If all goes as expected, a student priest, Fr. Benny Xavier, will come to St. Thomas More for the month of August. He is a member of the Carmelites and is studying in Rome.

2010 MASS BOOK—The 2010 Mass Book is available for reserving Masses during usual Church Office hours. If possible, have your requests on a piece of paper in case the office is unable to immediately help you with the bookings.

DON’T CALL MY CELL—Supposedly cell phone numbers will soon be in the hands of telemarketers, unless you do not want it to happen. Call 888.382.1222 to register your cell phone on the “do not call” list. The number does work and they say that it will take several weeks before the registry takes effect. Otherwise, you can report them and they will get fined!

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on the encyclical letter of Benedict XVI God is Love and understanding the immigration issue in the USA. Today we focus on USA Immigration Laws. In 1882 the Chinese Exclusion Act barred the entry of Chinese. In 1921 the Quota Act created immigration quotas. In 1952 the McCarran-Walter Act set up a quota system based on national origin, set preference for education and relatives in USA, and is still in force today. In 1992 the Immigration Reform and Control Act gave amnesty to undocumented who lived in USA since before January 1, 1982. It also imposed sanctions on employers who knowingly hired undocumented workers. In 1996 the Illegal Immigrant Responsibility Act doubled the number of border guards to 10,000 and denied government benefits to non-citizens. In 2000 the Legal Immigration Family Equity Act allowed undocumented people married to citizens before December 21, 2000 to seek permanent residency. In 2006 the Secure Fence Act required erection of 700 miles of fence along the Mexican border. What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? There are many sides to immigration reform. The present system is not working to the best interest of all. There are strong feelings on this subject. Your Justice and Peace Committee feels that education will help in understanding this problem. The time is now for comprehensive reform. As citizens we have to take an active part in informing our representatives of our concerns and wishes. As Catholics, and followers of Jesus, let us look at the immigration issue from the encyclical God is Love. Jesus asked us to love God with all we have and to love the neighbor and stranger in our midst. *To be continued.*

What You Need to Know About a Program that Prevents Hunger & Improves Nutrition for Better Health

At this most difficult economic time, the Nutrition Outreach and Education Program (NOEP) may be able to help. NOEP is a network of local community-based organizations that have expertise in helping New Yorkers enroll in the Food Stamp Program. The Food Stamp Program is a federally funded nutrition assistance program that helps people to purchase the food they need to stay healthy. Eligible recipients purchase food at any supermarket with an Electronic Benefit Card (EBT), which functions like a debit card.

Due to recently increased guidelines and more generous deductions, seniors (60 years and older) and families with significant child and dependant care expenses, may now be eligible for nutrition assistance through food stamp benefits. For more information, contact: Suffolk residents: 631-789-9546.
